- Public art


The 'Waterfront Village Centre Neighbourhood Plan', approved by Council in 2022, establishes the land uses and planning policy for the 91.5 acre site. The neighbourhood will include:

- 5,500 residential units
- Office space
- 9,253 sq. m. (99,600sq. ft.) of retail and commercial
- 4.7 hectares (11.5 acres) of park land
- 2.1 hectares (5.1 acres) of restored natural area
- A 4,645 sq. m. (50,000 sq. ft.) community centre on a 1.5-acre parcel land




It includes five distinct components that will work together to create a waterfront promenade with green spaces and places to relax and socialize:


HEALTH & WELLBEING

Health & Wellbeing

This facility will be targeting a Rick Hansen Foundation Accessibility Gold Certification, a holistic and people-focused accessibility framework.

Sustainability

Fraser Mills has adopted community-wide climate action principles, habitat restoration, water retention, and energy consumption standards.

a major aspect of this work.







Aquatic amenities cater to a diverse range of activities and provide a variety of health and wellness benefits for the entire community. Lane swimming, family water play, swimming lessons, soaking in a hot tub, and relaxing in a sauna room can all be part of a robust multi-generational facility.

What is Public Art?

Public art refers to creative works, installations or interventions that are intentionally integrated into the public realm. It plays a vital role in helping to build complete communities, engage with our surroundings in diverse ways, and instill a meaningful sense of place for residents and visitors alike.


Any public art at Fraser Mills will align with the City's public art policy.

Common forms of public art include:

- Murals
- Sculptures
- Decorative signage and wayfinding
- Digital art installations
- Functional art (e.g., seating, lighting)
- Landscape features (e.g., artwork integrated into landscape and aquatic features)
- Architectural interventions (e.g., artwork integrated into a building façade)
- Interactive art (e.g., through touch, movement, sound, etc.)

Please note: Engagement and collaboration with kwikwa\(\)am First Nation will play a significant role in establishing the arts and cultural components of the Fraser Mills neighbourhood. There is a separate but complimentary process taking place to help establish those.
